

# WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THE COVID-19 AND WHAT WE CAN DO:

As California reopens, majority of stay-at-home restrictions will be lifted, it has been fifteen months after the first COVID-19 stay-at-home order was issued to California residents. Just a few months ago, hospitals were overwhelmed with critically ill patients seeking limited beds.

While the outlook for California has improved, COVID-19 remains a very real threat. Even while the infection incidence and hospitalizations in the state are at record lows, the pandemic is not done. Still, fewer people are dying from COVID-19 than they were six months earlier.

It is a known fact that as physical distancing and requirement for masks are being lifted, hospitalizations and COVID-19 cases will begin to increase.

As demand for vaccines declines, public health officials are concerned about how new illnesses will emerge among the unvaccinated. Will the state experience another increase in cases? Who and where are at risk?

# CALIFORNIA HAS NOT YET ACHIEVED HERD

According to scientists, 70 to 85 percent of the overall population must be vaccinated in order to achieve widespread protection against the virus.

As of June 30, 2022 California has administered 77,630,160 which is 84% of the population. It is almost there but not quite yet.

### **POSSIBLE OUTBREAKS**

Experts predict another COVID-19 outbreak. They emphasize that it won't be as bad as past surges, when labs and hospitals were overloaded.

Scientists anticipate another surge of illnesses in fall or winter. It is ideal to prepare and vaccinate more individuals on or before these outbreaks



# MANY ELDERS DESPITE BEING MORE VULNERABLE AREN'T VACCINATED

Despite being among the most vulnerable to the virus, 1.5 million California seniors have not been vaccinated. Seniors account for 16% of the state's population and 73% of COVID deaths. 22% are unvaccinated.

People 65 and older have been eligible for vaccinations since mid-January, despite misinformation and supply concerns.

Access concerns affect many elderly. If they don't drive, they rely on family schedules. If they're sick or homebound, public health departments and providers may visit them.



# BOOSTER SHOT REQUIREMENTS AND ELIGIBILITY

Individuals who have waning immunity may need additional protection to more dangerous variants. Adults who are immunocompromised as well as those with comorbidities and Senior who are among the most vulnerable to the virus are the primary target for the booster shot

Like many other diseases, vaccination immunity can decline over time, but because COVID-19 is new, it's unclear how long protection will persist.

### PIN 22-07-ASC UPDATED STATWIDE VISITATION WAIVER, AND TESTING AND VACCINATION VERIFICATION GUIDANCE FOR VISITORS

Resident's rights to visitation are waived and indoor visitation shall be permitted only in accordance with this waiver. Visitation shall also be limited or modified. Unless otherwise noted, all visitors, including support persons, are subject to visitation restrictions.

During the time when regular visitation is limited, facilities must create other arrangements (such as Virtual Visitation and Outdoor Visitation)

### General Visitation Requirements for Licensees

For any visitor entering the facility, regardless of their vaccination status, licensees must:

- Designate a facility staff to conduct initial screening for COVID-19 symptoms of all individuals entering the facility.
- Require visitors to be screened for fever and COVID-19 symptoms, wear a well-fitting face mask
- Exclude visitors showing COVID-19 symptoms



### **Virtual Visitation**

Arrange for alternative communication for visitors such as phone calls, video calls, and online communications. As of January 1, 2022, licensees that have internet access must provide at least one internet accessible device.

### **Outdoor Visitation**

Outdoor visits pose a lower risk of transmission due to increased space and airflow; therefore, any outdoor visitation is preferred.

You and the licensee of your facility may continue to use existing resources to access COVID-19 vaccines for an additional or a booster dose. These resources include:

- 1. **MyTurn.** The CDPH website myturn.ca.gov provides vaccine registration, scheduling for vaccine appointments, and notification.
- 2. Vaccine Finder. https://www.vaccines.gov/ The CDC website Vaccine Finder provides nearby vaccine locations, including retail pharmacy locations.
- 3. Local Health Departments (LHDs). LHDs may have information available about locations where COVID-19 vaccine is available in the local community. Please check your LHD's https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Pages/LocalHealthServicesAndOffices.aspxweb site for vaccine information.








The Legislature adjourned for the month of July for summer recess. During the final days of June the Legislature and Governor grappled with (and ultimately came to agreement on) a nearly \$300 billion budget proposal, including a \$100 billion surplus. We are coming to the end of the second year of the two-year session, with the Legislature adjourning for the year on August 31st. There continues to be a great deal of focus on the need for more housing, and 6beds members continue to provide a positive contribution to that important policy priority. With COVID cases continuing to rise, we can anticipate residents' health and safety to remain on the radar of the Legislature and agencies such as the Department of Social Services. In addition to the last month of session, we anticipate members of the Legislature using the fall break to continue to focus on the urgent need for more housing, wildfire prevention, as well as the drought.

# LEGISLATIVE UPDATES



# The bills of interest and possible impact on 6beds members introduced this year among the total of more than 2400 bills include the following

- Assembly Bill 1967 by Assemblyman Daly would authorize a local agency to require a conditional use permit for transitional or supportive housing with 7 or more residents. This bill could have been problematic for the bill that 6beds has "sponsored", AB 2619. We were in communication with the author and committee with the hope of ensuring that as the bill advanced, it did not hinder our efforts to allow our members to increase the number of residents in their homes beyond the current cap of 6 residents. Fortunately, AB 1967 did not meet the Legislature's July 1st deadline for bills to pass out the policy committee. As a result, the bill is dead for the session.
- Assembly Bill 1720 by Assemblyman Holden would require the Department of Social Services to establish a process to grant a simplified criminal record exemption. It would also prohibit DSS (but apparently not licensees) from requiring prospective employees to disclose their prior encounters with the criminal justice system. 6beds lobbyists Bob Naylor and Roxanne Gould are in communication with the author and will continue to work with Assemblyman Holden to ensure that as the bill proceeds, it is of benefit to 6beds members while also ensuring that residents are cared for safely. The bill has been scheduled for hearing in the Senate Appropriations Committee on August 1st when the Legislature reconvenes.

# LEGISLATIVE UPDATES



• Senate Bill 1093 by Senator Hurtado requires a transfer of a criminal record clearance to be submitted on a form provided by the Department of Social Services, or via a web portal. SB 1093 would permit the licensee to verify the individual's identity and removes the requirement for an individual to submit a copy of their driver's license (or other valid government identification) along with a request for transfer of a criminal record clearance. Senator Hurtado has been a champion of 6Beds.inc and we will continue to work closely with her on this measure. The bill has been scheduled to be heard in the Assembly Appropriations Committee on August 3rd.

### **Additional Delayed Bill We Support:**

### AB 499 (Blanca Rubio)—referral source for RCFEs: duties

• This bill to regulate referral agencies, nearly enacted last year, was put over to this year at the request of Attorney General Bonta's office, which seems to be interested in strengthening regulation. The bill is sponsored by A Place for Mom, and we worked over two years with committee staff to improve the bill—the latest amendment requires a referral agency to cease contacting or making referrals to a person within 10 days of a request to cease such activity. We agreed to support the bill with that amendment. The bill is still pending on the Senate floor and we are monitoring it for any amendments and a possible hearing date.

### Bills We Sponsored and Will Pursue Next Year

# AB 2619 (Patterson) Residential care facilities for the elderly capacity

- This bill was introduced by Assemblyman Patterson at 6beds.Inc's request and cosponsored by the California Commission on Aging. The bill amends the CA RCFE Act to allow RCFE's, currently serving 6 or fewer individuals to instead serve more than 6 individuals if the residence is in a residential zone and has sufficient square footage to accommodate the additional residents. Assemblyman Patterson has had personal family experience with 6beds types of facilities and is a huge believer in the value that they bring to our communities. Unfortunately, the bill ran into concerns raised by the Assembly Human Services Committee consultant and was held in committee. The 6beds board intends to pursue this bill again next year. Other issues 6beds is working on.
- 6beds leadership has alerted your lobbyists to the insurance crisis for RCFEs and we arranged a call between the California Department of Insurance and the 6beds Board of Directors highlighting that crisis. We are in further communication with the Department of Insurance to identify solutions to this crisis and avoid more home closures.
- We are also working with a coalition to respond to the CDC extending the time required between hires and employees receiving the COVID dose (up to 8 weeks) in order to reduce the risk of myocarditis. We believe that the new guidance will make it much more difficult to bring employees on board in a timely manner. We are proposing that allowing for individuals to be hired and work after their first COVID dose, with masking and testing and screening in place until the second dose, is the most practical solution and would avoid possible staffing shortfalls.

# LEGISLATIVE UPDATES



### Bills We Sponsored and Will Pursue Next Year

### AB 2546 (Nazarian) Resident Designated Support Persons Act

• Would give residents of nursing homes and RCFEs the right to designate a minimum of two relatives or other persons as support persons and require the facilities to grant access, not subject to visiting hour restrictions, to at least one of them at a time for in person visits during declared emergencies, subject to required health protocols. Would require the facilities to provide languageappropriate written infection control protocols and to supply PPE free of charge to meet the same PPE requirements as for their staff. The author amended AB 2546 into an entirely different bill on motor vehicle sideshows and it died in the Senate Transportation Committee.

### Community Care Expansion

The 2021-22 state budget appropriated \$570 million for the Community Care Expansion program. The program is providing grants for acquisition, construction and rehabilitation of community care facilities, including RCFEs and ARFs, with a focus on those facilities that are serving or could serve SSI recipients including those who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness. A request for applications was issued on January 6, and applications for grants are being reviewed. Information on this program is available at infrastructure.buildingcalhhs.com.

This funding is a result of concern we and others expressed about the number of RCFEs that have closed in recent years, the difficulty of serving those with only SSI grants, and the promising role these facilities can play in assisting seniors and mentally ill individuals at risk of homelessness. If this program is deemed a success, there may well be additional funding.

### PIN 22-13-ASC - Adult And Senior Care (ASC)- Updated Regulations For Infection Control Requirements

- Updated guidelines on hand hygiene, environmental cleaning and disinfection, injection and medication safety, use of personal protective equipment (PPE), hygiene and cough etiquette, and the reprocessing of reusable medical equipment.
- When a State or federal emergency for a communicable disease is proclaimed or declared, the licensee must develop an Emergency Infection Control Plan that includes additional infection control measures that are not already addressed to prevent, contain, and mitigate the associated communicable disease.

### PIN 22-14-ASC - Informational Call Regarding Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) And Infection Control Plan Guidance

- This PIN announces an upcoming informational call with Adult and Senior Care (ASC) licensees and their staff on April 20, 2022 to review new and current COVID-19 requirements and updates.
- The call will focus on providing updates on COVID-19 variants, vaccinations, and reviewing new infection control requirements, etc.

# PIN 22-15-ASC - Resident Cohorting, Isolation and Quarantine, Staffing, and Use of Personal Protective Equipment Based on Resident Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Status

- Exposed residents who are unvaccinated, or who have completed their primary series and are booster eligible but not yet boosted, now only have to complete 7-10 days quarantine instead of 14 days.
- Removes the recommendation that residents who are boosted, OR have completed their primary series residents who have recovered from COVID-19 in the prior 90 days be routinely quarantined following an exposure.

# **PINs Update**

PIN 22-16-ASC - Updated Diagnostic And Response Testing Guidance For Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19)

Supplemental Guidance for PIN 22-16-ASC: Updated Diagnostic and Response Testing Guidance for Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19)

- New facility staff and facility staff returning from a leave of absence who are unvaccinated with an exemption to the vaccination requirement, should be tested prior to working in the facility and must be tested at least once weekly after their start date
- Licensees may consider continuing diagnostic screening testing for facility staff who have received all recommended doses if they have underlying immunocompromising conditions.

PIN 22-17-ASC - Informational Call Regarding Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Testing, Quarantine, and Isolation

- This PIN announces an upcoming informational call with Adult and Senior Care (ASC) licensees and their staff on May 25, 2022.
- Topics to be discussed include: (1) providing updates on COVID-19; (2) reviewing new testing guidance; (3) reviewing new isolation and quarantine guidance; and (4) answering your questions.

PIN 22-18-ASC - Infection Control Plan Courtesy Forms For Adult And Senior Care Facilities

- This PIN announces the release of the Infection Control Plan courtesy forms for Adult and Senior Care (ASC) facilities with the exception of Adult Residential Facilities for Persons with Special Health Care Needs (ARFPSHNs).
- The forms are provided as a courtesy to help applicants and licensees meet the requirements pursuant to the applicable Infection Control Requirements section of the California Code of Regulations (CCR)

PIN 22-19-ASC - Informational Call Regarding Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Second Booster, Test To Treat, And Infection Control Plan Forms

- This PIN announces an upcoming informational call with Adult and Senior Care (ASC) licensees and their staff on June 15, 2022.
- Topics to be discussed include: (1) providing updates on COVID-19; (2) providing updates on the second booster for COVID-19; (3) reviewing the Test to Treat program; (4) reviewing infection control plan courtesy forms; and (5) answering your questions.


