Test positivity is based on a 7-day average with no lag. Directional change is compared to the prior 7-day period. Data is provided by the California Department of Public Health. FLU OR COVID-19: THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN A FLU AND COVID-19

Flu season typically occurs in the United States during the fall and winter. Although influenza viruses spread throughout the year, flu activity typically peaks between December and February. Season to season, the influenza's health impact (infections, hospitalizations, and deaths) tends to vary.

COVID-19 and influenza can cause comparable symptoms. However, there are a number of distinctions between them.

The novel coronavirus strain (SARS-CoV-2) is responsible for coronavirus disease 19 (COVID-19).

COVID-19 and influenza are both contagious respiratory diseases that spread from person to person.

Flu Symptoms

- Fever
- Malaise
- Headache
- Runny nose
- Sneezing
- Reduced sense of smell
- Metallic taste in mouth
- Chills
- Cough
- Body pain or muscle pain
- Sore throat

These symptoms can also occur in people with COVID-19.

COVID-19 Symptoms

- Fever
- Shortness of breath
- Dry cough
- Fatigue
- Headache
- Muscle or body aches
- New loss of smell or taste
- Nausea
- Diarrhea

Not all individuals with COVID-19 exhibit all of these symptoms. Some individuals may exhibit cold-like symptoms without a fever. Others may only experience a loss of smell or taste, while others may exhibit no symptoms whatsoever.

Key Differences between COVID-19 and Influenza:

Influenza "Flu"

The majority of those infected with influenza will recover on their own within a few days to two weeks, but others will have severe complications and may require hospitalization. With influenza, secondary bacterial infections are more common than with COVID-19.

















Diarrhea is more common in young children than in adults with influenza.



COVID-19

Additional COVID-19 problems include blood clots in the veins and arteries of the lungs, heart, legs, or brain.

Post-COVID problems can affect everyone who has had COVID-19, even if their illness was mild or they had no symptoms. Post-COVID Conditions refer to a range of symptoms that may persist for weeks or months after initial infection with the virus that causes COVID-19, or emerge weeks after first infection.

PIN 22-07-ASC UPDATED STATWIDE VISITATION WAIVER, AND TESTING AND VACCINATION VERIFICATION GUIDANCE FOR VISITORS

Resident's rights to visitation are waived and indoor visitation shall be permitted only in accordance with this waiver. Visitation shall also be limited or modified. Unless otherwise noted, all visitors, including support persons, are subject to visitation restrictions.

During the time when regular visitation is limited, facilities must create other arrangements (such as Virtual Visitation and Outdoor Visitation)

General Visitation Requirements for Licensees

For any visitor entering the facility, regardless of their vaccination status, licensees must:

- Designate a facility staff to conduct initial screening for COVID-19 symptoms of all individuals entering the facility.
- Require visitors to be screened for fever and COVID-19 symptoms, wear a well-fitting face mask
- Exclude visitors showing COVID-19 symptoms



Virtual Visitation

Arrange for alternative communication for visitors such as phone calls, video calls, and online communications. As of January 1, 2022, licensees that have internet access must provide at least one internet accessible device.

Outdoor Visitation

Outdoor visits pose a lower risk of transmission due to increased space and airflow; therefore, any outdoor visitation is preferred.

HOLIDAY SAFETY



With the holiday season approaching, here are tips for healthy celebrations during family visitation for gatherings:

- Get vaccinated or boosted
- Wear a mask

Indoors, especially if your celebration includes high risk people

Always when COVID-19 rates are high or increasing, OR at least in the 5-7 days before the event

- Test
2 days before events and again on the day of
Stay home if you test positive for COVID-19

- Event planning
Smaller groups mean lower risk
Ventilation helps, and alcohol and drugs can impair judgement
What will you do if you or someone else is/gets sick?

HOW TO PREPARE FOR ACTIVE SHOOTER SITUATIONS

Keeping tabs of a location's exit and upholding safety and security practices go a long way in preparing for an active shooter situation. An active shooter is an individual who has an active intent in killing or attempting to kill people in a confined and populated area. In addition to being unpredictable, active shooters have no method of selection of their victims.

Active shooter situations often span between 10-15 minutes, and end before law enforcement arrive. Individuals must be prepared mentally and physically to deal with the active shooter situation.

When the active shooter is in your vicinity, follow these steps. Quickly determine the most reasonable way to protect your own life. If possible, follow the lead of knowledgeable senior employees.

1. Evacuate

If there is an accessible escape path, attempt to evacuate the premises. Be sure to:

- Have an escape route and plan in mind
- Evacuate regardless of whether others agree to follow
- Leave your belongings behind
- Prevent individuals from entering an area where the active shooter may be
- Keep your hands visible
- Follow the instructions of any police officers
- Do not attempt to move wounded people
- Call 911 when you are safe

2. Hide Out

If evacuation is not possible, find a place to hide where the active shooter is less likely to find you. Your hiding place should:

- Be out of the active shooter's view
- Provide protection if shots are fired in your direction (i.e., an office with a closed and locked door)

To prevent an active shooter from entering your hiding place:

- Lock the door
- Blockade the door with heavy furniture

If the active shooter is nearby:

- Lock the door
- Silence your cell phone and/or pager
- Hide behind large items (i.e., cabinets, desks)
- Remain quiet

HOW TO PREPARE FOR ACTIVE SHOOTER SITUATIONS

If evacuation and hiding out are not possible:

- Remain calm
- Dial 911, if possible, to alert police to the active shooter's location
- if you cannot speak, leave the line open and allow the dispatcher to listen

3. Take action against the active shooter

- Lock the door
- Silence your cell phone and/or pager
- Turn off any source of noise (i.e., radios, televisions)
- Hide behind large items (i.e., cabinets, desks)
- Remain quiet

If evacuation and hiding out are not possible:

- Remain calm
- Dial 911, if possible, to alert police to the active shooter's location
- f you cannot speak, leave the line open and allow the dispatcher to listen



TRAINING YOUR STAFF FOR AN ACTIVE SHOOTER SITUATION

To best respond to unforeseen active shooter situations, creating an Emergency Action plan along with appropriate training is non negotiable. The formulation of the EAP must include key stakeholders in different departments. This can be human resources, facility owners, operations, property manager, local law enforcement. The plan shall be the reference for preparation and after the fact, focus on evacuation plans, important members and contact plans in order to arrange with other necessary departments i.e hospitals.

A practical way to prepare staff for active shooter events is by conducting mock active shooter training exercises. Local law enforcement is an excellent resource in designing training exercises. Before training, prevention can be practised as well by fostering a respectful workplace, and by being aware of indications of workplace violence and taking remedial actions accordingly.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATES

Both the California State Senate and Assembly convened for an organizational session on December 5, 2022, to kick off the 2023-2024 legislation session. At this time, each house also formally elected their leadership. Senate Pro Tem Toni Atkins will continue to remain the leader of the Senate. In the Assembly, the Democratic Caucus met following the elections and determined that Assembly Speaker Rendon (termed out in 2024) will continue to serve as Speaker, but relinquish the position to Assembly Member Robert Rivas (Salinas) on June 30th, at the conclusion of the 2023-24 state budget deliberations.

With nearly a fourth of the Legislature being newly elected this year, we will see a number of new committee chairmanships and committee assignments. New members will face a challenging environment with the decline in expected state revenues and likely deficit. Additionally, the Governor has officially called a special session regarding oil and gas prices that started December 5th, but the Legislature will not start its deliberations until the new year.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATES



With the Legislature reconvening in January, 6beds lobbyists will be pursuing legislation to allow 6beds members to expand the number of rooms they can rent in their facilities (depending on available space) as well as legislation to improve the process associated with referral agencies - transparency around the fees that they charge and information provided to prospective residents and their families.

General Election Update

On November 8th, California held its General Election to vote on all state constitutional offices, all Assembly seats (80), and half (20) of the Senate seats. Although there is one race that is undergoing a recount, it appears that the overall makeup of the Legislature will not significantly change. The Legislature will continue with a Democratic supermajority - the Senate will include 32 Democrats and 8 Republicans, and the Assembly will include 62 Democrats and 18 Republicans. The ability of Democrats to hold on to a supermajority, with more than two-thirds of the seats in each house, allows them to determine the Legislature's priorities and positions on an array of the state budget, tax, and policy issues.

Provider Information Notices (PINs) Updates for Adult and Senior Care (ASC) Program

NOTE: Prior to November 2016, CCLD information currently being communicated in PIN form was communicated in the form of Provider Letters and CCLD Information Releases. To receive email notifications when a PIN has been released please email ccldpolicynotification@dss.ca.gov

- **PIN 22-28.1-ASC - (Supersedes PIN 22-28-ASC) Best Practices for Visitation Related to Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) and the Rescission of the Statewide Visitation Waiver**
- Licensees should continue to offer testing for visitors in accordance with recommendations from CDPH. However, visitors are no longer required to be tested or show proof of vaccination as a condition of visitation. In addition, visitors must wear masks and observe appropriate COVID-19 infection prevention practices.
- The best practices for licensees and visitors include wearing an appropriate fitting mask, frequent washing of hands, covering of mouth when coughing, increased ventilation by opening of windows, etc.

PIN 22-29-ASC - (Supersedes PIN 22-20-ASC) California Department Of Public Health (CDPH) Recommendations For Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Vaccines And Updated Booster Doses

- The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends everyone stay up to date with COVID-19 vaccination, including all primary series doses and boosters for their age group. Updated COVID-19 boosters can both help restore protection that has decreased since previous vaccination and provide broader protection against newer variants.

PINs Update

PIN 22-30-ASC - (Supersedes PIN 22-21-ASC) End of State of Emergency Related to Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) and Expiration of COVID-19 Waivers

- Governor Newsom issued an announcement that the COVID-19 State of Emergency (SOE) will end on February 28, 2023.
- Although the SOE will end in February, CDSS recognizes that COVID-19 continues to exist. California has the tools and resources needed to continue fighting COVID-19 when the SOE terminates. An important resource is the Governor's California SMARTER Plan Progress Updates October 2022.

PIN 22-31-ASC - Informational Call Regarding Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19): Latest Updates: Waivers, Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV), Flu, and COVID-19

- The COVID-19 State of Emergency SOE in California will end on February 28, 2023 meaning facilities will have to resume regular pre-SOE operations. All licensing requirements will be reinstated as of March 1, 2023.
- COVID-19, Flu, RSV is called "the triple threat", all of which peak at different seasons and display different side effects. The best way to avoid it is to wash hands, mask up, get tested and isolate as much as possible. Be reminded that tests for each are available and. Shots and boosters for flu and COVID-19 are available.

PIN 22-32-ASC - 2022 Chaptered Legislation Affecting Adult And Senior Care Facilities: Summary And Implementation

- Skilled nursing facilities, intermediate care facilities, and residential care facilities for the elderly are required to have two written notices for prospective residents: (1) Admission agreements. (2) A notice that shall state that the ombudsman is intended as a resource for only specific resources.
- Senate Bill 1165 prohibits a licensee of a Social Rehabilitation Facility (SRF) from making a false or misleading statement or providing false or misleading information about medical treatments or medical services offered

PIN 22-33-ASC - Updating The Temporary Manager (TM) List

- The purpose of this PIN is to announce that CDSS is currently seeking qualified Temporary Managers who may be available for future appointment opportunities. The duties of the Temporary Manager are determined on a case-by-case basis, depending on the needs of persons in care.
- An individual or entity who wishes to be an ASCP Temporary Manager candidate and be placed on the Temporary Manager candidate list must complete the Temporary Manager Candidate List Applicant Information (LIC 215TM) form and submit the form to CCLASCPCAB@dss.ca.gov.

PIN 22-34-ASC - Announcing The Reorganization Of The Assistant Program Administrator

- PIN 22-34-ASC announces the realignment of four Adult and Senior Care Regional Offices in two field operations. Firstly, the Sacramento North and Sacramento South Regional Offices will begin reporting to Operations 1 under Assistant Program Administrator (APA) Pam Gill.
- Secondly, The San Bruno and Oakland Regional Offices will begin reporting to the Operations 2 under APA Stacy Barlow.

PIN 22-35-ASC - Informational Call Regarding Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19): New Visitation Guidance, Clarifications, and Holiday Safety

- Screening is recommended for COVID-19 symptoms and exposures. Screening may be passive, for example: posting signs at facility entrances reminding visitors to self-screen for COVID-19; not to visit if they are experiencing symptoms/not feeling well or have been exposed to COVID-19. Daily screening for COVID-19 is applicable for staff and persons in care, excluding visitors.
- Holiday safety tips include wearing a mask during events with high risk people, or prevent infection by masking up the days prior. Test two days before the event and the day of, and consider that smaller groups mean lower risk.

ACCESSING VACCINES FOR AN ADDITIONAL OR A BOOSTER DOSE

You and the licensee of your facility may continue to use existing resources to access COVID-19 vaccines for an additional or a booster dose. These resources include:

1. **MyTurn.** The CDPH website myturn.ca.gov provides vaccine registration, scheduling for vaccine appointments, and notification.
2. **Vaccine Finder.** <https://www.vaccines.gov/> The CDC website Vaccine Finder provides nearby vaccine locations, including retail pharmacy locations.
3. **Local Health Departments (LHDs).** LHDs may have information available about locations where COVID-19 vaccine is available in the local community. Please check your LHD's <https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Pages/LocalHealthServicesAndOffices.aspx> website for vaccine information.
4. **Local Retail Pharmacies.** Pharmacies and grocery stores such as CVS <https://www.cvs.com/international.html>, Walgreens <https://www.walgreens.com/findcare/vaccination/covid/19/landing>, Albertsons <https://www.mhealthappointments.com/covidappt>, Safeway <https://www.safeway.com/pharmacy/covid-19.html>, and others offer COVID-19 vaccination appointments.
5. **Healthcare Providers.** The COVID-19 vaccine may also be available through healthcare providers, such as hospitals, clinics, doctor's offices, and other locations. If you seek vaccination through a private healthcare provider, you should consult with, or check the website for, your primary care provider.
6. **Regional Centers.** Information about accessing the COVID-19 vaccine may also be available through your Regional Center if you have an intellectual and/or developmental disability.
